CHAPLAIN'S CORNER



Change Is Inevitable.

It is said that the only one who likes change is a baby with a dirty diaper!

Pastor Jones was getting acquainted with the members of his new flock. As he talked with a man who had been a member of the church for more than 60

years, the pastor said, "You must have seen a lot of changes in your life with this church." The man replied, "Yes, and I have been against every one of them!"

When Wesleyan Village took a community survey earlier this year, around 3 of 4 respondents (73%) agreed or strongly agreed with the statement: "I would like to see a different approach to spiritual emphasis programs." Wow, that sounds like change!

When the Wesleyan Village Board hired me last January, they charged me with the mission of combining Camp Meeting and Bible Conference in 2023.

One of the first people that I reached out to when I became community chaplain was Dr. Marlin Mull. Marlin is a fascinating man who served both as Wesleyan Village President and Pastor of Brooksville Wesleyan Church. He wanted me to know that the efforts to merge Camp Meeting and Bible Conference began at least 15 years ago. Many other village leaders have also supported this consolidation of the two events.

Dr. Mull and other longtime residents told me that Camp Meetings and Bible Conferences were originally held every January and March with each session lasting a week, and that meant having morning, afternoon and evening meetings every day!

Those attending Camp Meetings and Bible Conferences would gather at the old Brooksville Wesleyan Church in the heart of the village, near the corner of Victory and Jasmine Roads. It was just a short walk for many people in the village to attend the three daily services. It was also convenient for the people to attend lunch, supper and the snack bar in the Elliott Center.

It fascinates me to realize that our Elliott Center is precisely where the original tent meetings were held that marked the founding of Wesleyan Village! So much of our history goes back to the Wesleyan Camp Meetings held in the heart of our village on Wesley Drive!

- With this in mind, I have some information to share with you about the upcoming Camp Meeting Homecoming which will be held February 28—March 5, 2023: Camp Meeting is returning to the place it began.
- Dr. Steve Lennox, President of Kingswood University, and Dr. Linda Adams, Bishop of the Free Methodist Church, look forward to sharing their presentations with us in the Nicholson Center. They are planning to include opportunities for us to interact with each other in tables of eight. These tables will also give us a place to open our Bibles and other study materials in an informal, educational setting. Both Steve and Linda will be able to engage with us in informal discussions with them as they offer their teaching.
- Coffee and other beverages will be available during both the morning and evening sessions.
- Special arrangements for Worship Music will be provided by local church and village "in house" ministries.
- We will be reaching out to the greater Hernando County community to invite as many people as we can.
- The weekly meal schedule at Nicholson Café will be maintained with the benefit and convenience of close proximity to the morning and evening meetings.
- Our friends in the Retired School Personnel
 Fellowship (RSPF) are planning to offer their snack
 bar refreshments at the Nicholson Center following the
 evening sessions.

We are <u>not</u> seeking to abolish or do away with Camp Meeting! We are trying to be open to the Holy Spirit's leading as we try something new.

MAINTENANCE CORNER




Winston Churchill famously stated, "To improve is to change; to be perfect is to change often." Over the course of the past month, the maintenance department has been intentionally working to implement effective change in the organizational systems and structures used. While many of these changes are not seen, there is one location, the RV storage lot, where these changes are readily apparent.

Having an organized and well-planned storage lot has been a challenge for several years.

Multiple attempts in the past have fallen short in creating an environment that honors both year-long and seasonal renters. Still, it's important to continue to work towards the goal of organization.

To that end, working off several suggestions and recommendations from RV owners, administrators, and others, a very simple layout was developed, laid out, and is now being implemented. While this layout is far from perfect, it is a welcome change from the chaos that existed previously and a positive move in the right direction. FROM THE BOARD ROOM



All Directors attended the board meeting on November 15, 2022, either in person or by Zoom connection. It was a productive meeting which included a break to enjoy the first lunch of the season in the Nicholson Centre Café. Since there is no such thing as a "free lunch" we then returned to complete the business of the day.

Reports were received from the Community Chaplain, the Community Manager, the Treasurer and the Development Team. We continue to make steady but slow progress on the Epworth Expansion project. The eight new duplexes in Shepherds Court are awaiting permits before the work may begin.

The Board reviewed our fund balances and assessment projections for the fiscal year. We took action to ensure reserve fund designations were honored and necessary balances were maintained. Some of these details were shared at our recent Community Coffee.

Paragraph #3 on page 20 of our *Covenants* was revised to allow for six (6') foot fences where they are permitted by County code. This was provided as a printed insert at the Community Coffee. If you

were not there to receive a copy, stop by the office and request one.

Two Policies were revised: PD 02.21 Modification & Compliance, and PD 04.07.15 RV Park and RV Storage. The revised RV Storage policy and the new rates will take effect January 1, 2023. If you have paid for a year, your rate continues the same until your renewal time. If you are one of those few persons with multiple vehicles in storage, you may wish to stop into the office and find out if it will be to your advantage to renegotiate your current arrangement. There will be a slight increase to the rates next year, but without that increase we would have actually lost money because of the changes in our policy.

Three new Policies were adopted. PD 03.02 *Key Control* is designed to safeguard our community keys and carefully regulate those keys that residents assign to our office to be used in case of an emergency or other specified purpose. If you have keys stored at the office, we encourage you to stop in to pick up FRM 03.02 "Assignment of Keys" which may bring you a little "piece of mind" about how we are safeguarding what you have entrusted to us.

PD 04.07.01 *Property Transactions* permits us to collect a Capital fee from persons who purchase property in Wesleyan Village. Those funds will be designated for improvement of our roads. In an effort to be fair to our employees, we adopted PD 03.08 *Workplace Standards* which

defines expected workplace behavior.

The Board also approved the sale of our property at 22277 Wilson Memorial Drive, and the expenditure of \$65,000 to upgrade our WWTS in order to meet the new standards established by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection. Discussions with the City of Brooksville on connecting to their municipal sewer system are ongoing.
